A centre for transplantation excellence made possible by your support

Building on our track record for excellence in transplantation, Austin Health is currently developing the Australian Centre for Transplantation Excellence and Research (ACTER). Thousands of Australians wait for organ transplants each year and sadly many never find a suitable donor. One of ACTER's goals is to improve access and equity in transplants, while uniting our transplant streams, research and education under one roof.

A project like this requires great investment and we are so grateful that more than \$2.5 million in philanthropic commitments have been made for ACTER-related projects so far.

Sharing transplant advancements

In 2024 ACTER hosted several events with leading international guest speakers sharing advancements in the field of transplantation, such as the Advanced Liver Disease Symposium, the Cytomegalovirus and Transplant Infectious Diseases Symposium and the Smallwood Oration.

In October, a four-day program of lectures and panels culminated in the prestigious Smallwood Oration, which was delivered by Professor of Transplantation Chris Watson from Cambridge University, on the past, present and future of organ preservation.

All the Smallwood Oration events included patient perspectives, which was a particular highlight in a truly inspiring week and reflects ACTER's commitment to ensuring patients inform the transplant care we deliver.

We thank the many donors and supporters who joined us for events in 2024 and have donated to transplantation services over the years.



A second chance at life

When a patient has a successful organ transplant, they can go from being near death to making a remarkable recovery within a short period of time. This miraculous experience was described by one patient during the Smallwood Oration - liver transplant recipient Jessica Chappell.

"The day I received the call - more than 400 days after being waitlisted - the joy was bittersweet. For me to live, someone else had to die. Somewhere in Victoria, while my family was praying I would survive surgery, another family was mourning their loved one.

The miracle of transplantation is not just about one life saved; it's about entire families, entire communities touched by the selfless gift of donation."

30 years of kindness: Robert Charles Bulley

The late Robert Charles Bulley OAM (13 October 1924 – 29 September 2019) was a humble, yet extraordinary supporter of Austin Health, leaving a legacy that continues to make an impact. Over three decades Robert's generosity has supported the hospital in countless ways, guided by his deep desire to help others.

Robert's first gift to Austin Health in 1993 started a 30-year partnership of giving which continues today through the Robert C Bulley Charitable Fund, a fund that Robert established. The fund has contributed approximately \$300,000 to meet critical needs identified by the hospital. His generosity has supported a variety of initiatives, including lifesaving equipment and expanded programs to benefit patients and staff alike.

Awarded a posthumous Medal of the Order of Australia for his service to the community, Robert's legacy is a testament to his remarkable kindness. While modest about his contributions, Robert's giving was always purposeful. His fund continues to honour his values, with its latest commitment being an expanded staff wellbeing program for the Emergency Department.

Robert's story reminds us of the profound impact one person can have. His legacy of generosity will continue to benefit the community for years to come, ensuring his kindness lives on in the lives of those he helped.



Thanking two extraordinary volunteers: 100 years of service

This prestigious recognition honours their combined 101 years of dedicated service, embodying the spirit of community and selflessness.

The Diamond Creek Auxiliary was established in 1973 and became active in local fundraising activities. After opening the Diamond Creek Op Shop in 1980, its growing success prompted the auxiliary to focus efforts on the shop. The auxiliary (under the Friends of Austin Health) has raised a total of over \$4 million to support the hospital - a remarkable achievement made possible by dedicated volunteers like Yvonne and Claire.

Yvonne, a cornerstone of the auxiliary since it began, has served in many leadership roles, including president and secretary. Claire is known for her unwavering commitment after 50 years of service, taking two buses to attend her volunteer shifts. The auxiliary raised \$86 in its first year, compared to \$247,355 in 2022-23 to support Austin Health. These growing funds have enabled the purchase of essential medical equipment improving patient care, such as a perfusion machine, a surgical microscope and anaesthetic machines.

To celebrate their achievements, Yvonne and Claire received bouquets crafted with foliage from Austin Health's campus, thoughtfully designed by horticultural therapist Steven Wells. Their induction into the honour roll highlights the profound role of volunteers in strengthening public healthcare and supporting the community. We thank them for their extraordinary service and generosity.
